# National Sport Information Centre of Lao People's Democratic Republic

The National Sports Committee of Lao PDR was established in 1993 to "control sports movements in the whole country, including the mass organization, the National Olympic Committee and the National Sports Federations/Associations". One of the goals of the National Sports Development Master Plan to 2020 is the "Promotion of sports information".

In July of this year, with the assistance of the Australia Asia Sport Linkages program, a National Sport Information Centre (NSIC) is being established at the National Stadium in Vientiane. primary objective of the NSIC is to enable Lao coaches to access information and also to support the work of the Sports Committee, Olympic Committee Sports Federations. The problems faced by the NSIC reflect those of the National Sports Committee, that is, lack of facilities and equipment, lack of personnel, lack of advanced technology, and the distribution of programs outside Vientiane city and big provinces.

Australia-Asia Sports Linkages Program

The ASC undertakes sports development projects designed to assist countries address priority sports development needs, particularly in the areas of elite athlete development, coach education, junior sport, physical education, officials training, administration management and much more. Projects are agreed in consultation with countries of the region.

▲ With the assistance of the Australia Asia Sport Linkages program, the National Sport Information Centre of Laos P.D.R. was established in July 2000.

The initial task is to bring together and organize all of the information resources held by the officers of the Sports Olympic Committee, Committee Sports Federations so that everyone can have access to them. Existing resources consist of a small number of books, journals, videos, and other documents, mostly acquired by donation or from membership of international associations, and mostly in English. Very little sports information is available in the Lao language so the translation of core resources will be an important activity of the NSIC. Audiovisual resources are expected to be particularly useful to Lao coaches.



Access to Internet resources is also considered important and another task is to improve knowledge of sport information resources on the Internet, and the skills required to retrieve these, through training sessions and the production of a guide in Lao. There is very little access to the Internet outside of the major cities in Laos, and even here it is not widespread.

An important function of the NSIC will be the collection and preservation of Lao national sport information. A major source of this information is a fortnightly newspaper called "Sport News" produced by the media unit of the Sports Committee. Major sports in Laos are football (soccer), martial arts and boxing along with basketball, volleyball, sepak takraw, traditional rowing, shooting, badminton, tennis and golf. Athletes from Lao PDR will be competing in track and field (marathon) and swimming at the 2000 Olympics Games in Sydney and in powerlifting at the Paralympic Games.

Similar projects are also planned for and Cambodia. Vietnam encouraged by the formation of A.S.I.A. which I think will enhance co-operation and support in the region and hopefully be able to assist small countries such as Laos to further develop their NSIC and exchange sport information resources.




### **Share the Knowledge Programme**

"Share the Knowledge Programme" is a joint initiative of the International Council of Sport Science and Physical Education (ICSSPE), Human Kinetics Publishers and the International Olympic Committee. It aims to distribute sport science, physical education and sports books to institutions that do not have the financial resources to

buy them.

Human Kinetics Publishers is donating books that are not fit for resale to institutes in developing countries who are in need of literature for study, research and practical work in sport science, physical education, sport and fitness.





Books in all topic areas (academic and professional resources in physical education, health and fitness, coaching and sport sciences) published by Human Kinetics are available for distribution. Up to 50 books may be requested at one time. Currently all books are in English.

ICSSPE member institutions and national bodies belonging to ICSSPE member organizations in developing countries have priority for this programme and may contact the ICSSPE Executive Office for an application form. ICSSPE will forward completed applications to

Human Kinetics Publishers, where the books are selected and packaged. The International Olympic Committee will fund for the most cost-effective means of shipping the books to the "Share the Knowledge" applicant.

All three partner-organizations anticipate that this joint programme will enhance physical education and sport science research and training at higher education institutions in developing countries.

Meanwhile, International the Association for Sports Information (IASI) is conducting a survey to identify the information needed by each centre. will Completed questionnaires be transferred to the secretariat of ICSSPE in Berlin. ICSSPE will prioritize the requests (starting with the least developed countries of UNESCO) and contact Human Kinetics to ask them to ship the materials.

## **China Joint Sport Catalogue Established**

A new database, the "China Joint Sport Books Catalogue", has been created recently under a six-month joint effort between the China Sports Information Institute, the Library of Beijing and the Library of Beijing University of Physical Education.

Under the guidance of the Science & Education Department of China State Sport Administration General and coordinated the Committee of by Information and Documentation of Physical Education Colleges, the database was completed in January 2000.

Sixteen physical education colleges and sports research institutes in 30 provinces and municipalities have participated in the project. Physical education and sport collections in each college and institute were collected, checked and catalogued.

The database provides records of 14.876 books, catalogued by an internationally recognized system. The completion of the catalogue has laid a foundation for sharing a common sport information resource in China.

## **Manual For A Sports Information Centre**

To promote the development of sports information centres in those countries that are anxious to establish their own centres. the International Association for Sports Information (IASI) has published the "Manual For A Sports Information Centre".



Presented in an easy-to-read and non technical style, the Manual brings the reader the collective expertise and experiences of members of IASI in sport information management. The Manual also aims to provide practical guidelines for the delivery of sport information services in all parts of the world.



In part 1 of the Manual, key concepts related to the organization of sport information centres are explained while recommendations for the creation of a sport information centre are summarized in part 2.

Being a product of the joint effort between IASI and the International Olympic Committee, the Manual has been published in English, French and Spanish. A limited number of complimentary copies are available at the IASI Secretariat for institutions who are not members of IASI.

Individuals and relevant institutions are encouraged to join IASI as a member to enjoy a more active exchange of sport information.
