Report from the IASI Annual Meeting, Barcelona, Spain, March 14-18, 2002

At the kind invitation of Ms Glòria Pallé i Torres, Directora del Consell Català de l'Esport (Catalan Council of Sport of the Autonomous Government of Catalonia) and Maria Lluisa Berasategui, Head of the Sports Library, the IASI ExCo and members gathered together on March 14-18, 2002, for their annual meeting and seminar. On the first evening, members were invited to the Museu de l'Esport Dr. Melcoir Colet, for the welcoming address by Secretary General of Sport, Mr. Josep Maldonado i Gili.

On Friday, March 15, the Seminar for Catalonia's librarians, information professionals and IASI members was held (for seminar details see separate section below). After the seminar in late afternoon time was set aside for ahWG and regional meetings. That evening the official banquet, hosted by Ms Pallé i Torres, was held at a beautiful Barcelona restaurant. Many local delicacies (tapas) and the robust regional wine were enjoyed by all.

By Saturday, IASI President Alain Poncet called the first session of the meeting to order. Reports were heard from the President and Managerial Unit along with consideration of the association's financial affairs. The Vice-Presidents and the regional networks also reported on the year's activities. In the afternoon, the Open Forum, adeptly chaired by David Coleman, was held and resulted in 6 proposals to the ExCo.

Sunday had a very full agenda with the various reports from the Ad Hoc Working Groups, followed by news of IASI's work with our allied organizations, the IOC, ICSSPE, ENSSEE and the Pan-European Sports Information Service (see article below on this PESIS initiative). The meeting's agenda was concluded with a preliminary report on the plans for the IASI World Congress in Beijing. Ma Tie, VP for Asia, proposed that the Congress, IASI annual meeting and a workshop be held in the May 10-20, 2005 time period. He presented information on the

facilities, suggested a time line for notice releases and publishing of proceedings, registration information and services to congress participants. IASI President, Alain Poncet appointed the Program Committee chair, Ms. Cindy Slater, ExCo member from the US. The Program Committee Vice-Chair is Wang Huanfu from Beijing. Time was set aside late Monday afternoon for the Program Committee to hold its initial meeting. After much discussion assembled Program Committee members and hosts decided upon the theme of the IASI World Congress,

The Value of Sport Information: Toward Beijing 2008.

Five section themes were also approved. They are:



- Information Services for Olympic Games and International Competitions
- Sport Archives & Digitalization
- Sport Statistics; Standards & Services
- Future Needs in Sport Information
- Sport Information for Elite Athlete Development

On Monday IASI members were taken on tours of important sport facilities and museums. The first stop was the Galeria Olímpica / The Olympic Gallery located in a section of the Olympic Stadium. IASI members had a chance to view the artefacts, costumes from the Opening Ceremonies and memorabilia from the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona. The second stop was the Institut Nacional d'Educació Física de Catalunya / National Institute of Physical Education (INEFC) in Barcelona where members had a tour of the impressive facilities and the library. Travelling outside the city to Sant Cugat del Vallès, the tour took members to Le Centre d'Alt Rendiment (CAR) the important sport research and training center for elite athletes.

On behalf of all IASI members we thank our hosts for all their hard work in organizing a memorable annual meeting.

Seminar: the Impact of Internet on Sports Information, March 15, 2002

The Seminar focused on the highlights and some of the problems of access to sport information on the internet. The first speaker Mr. Santiago Orós reviewed the problems of copyright protection for documents and other intellectual property. He was followed by Ms Núria Gallart, UAB, who spoke on the balance between the rights of users and the creators of information. Ms Lluïsa Nuñez, outlined how the Barcelona University Library handled access to electronic journals. The final paper in the morning session by Jordi Serrano, UOC, presented methods for training users in how to use the virtual library effectively.

In the afternoon, Maria Lluïsa Berasategui and Josep M Rodriguez, outlined the digitizing work of the Sport Library where four sport history journals, *Los Deportes*, *Stadium*, *Xut!* and *Sport Català*, are now available online to internal users. The final session was a round table moderated

by Erika Schwarz and consisted of brief presentations on current Internet and sport information topics. Speakers included IASI administrators Alain Poncet, Ayala Maharik, Gretchen Ghent, Jill Haynes, José Aquesolo.

New Sport Information Centres Established in Vietnam and Cambodia

Through the Australia-Asian Sport Linkages Program funded by the Australian Government, two new sport information centres were established in Ho Chi Minh, Vietnam and Phnom Penh, Cambodia. Lesley Cioccarelli, Sport information Centre Consultant was the Australian government representative who went to South East Asian during July and September 2001 to provide expertise in the establishment of these centres. Both countries also received donations of books from Human Kinetics Publishers through the IASI assistance program to developing countries and additional donations of books and videotapes from the Australian Sports Commission. Lesley's edited report, forwarded to your editor by Jill Haynes, is reported here:

Vietnam

The National Sports University II and the National Training Centre II, located in Ho Chi Minh City serves the dual roles of a university of sport and a training facility for elite athletes. The Australia-Asia Sport Linkages program has been active in Vietnam for four years, and the coordinator of the program, Mark Warmington, recognized that there was a need for an information centre to support the work of the coaches, sport scientists and university teachers. The University has a library for students and there are hopes that in the future this may be amalgamated with the Sport Information Centre in the new purpose-built building.

Over a 5 week period Lesley worked with the sports science staff of the University to determine the requirements for a sport information centre, evaluate library management software, the preliminary design of an intranet website for sport information and an Internet website for the University. Recommendations were made to establish links with sport information organisations such as IASI, A.S.I.A., and other sport information centres in the region. Australia's National Sport Information Centre has offered some of their services at a reduced cost. Basic training was provided in the management of an information centre, searching the Internet and Web-based databases for sport information, and collection development and organization.

Cambodia

In the Kingdom of Cambodia Lesley worked with the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports. The intention is to establish a Sport Information Centre to provide services to the Ministry, which include the Department of Physical Education & Sport, the National Institute of Physical Education and Sport and the Olympic Committee of Cambodia, the national sport federations, national coaches and athletes. The National Institute produces an excellent monthly Sports

Magazine in the Khmer language. Each issue contains local sport news and information as well as translated articles from other sources. It is distributed widely within these organizations.

Most of the work in the 2 week period focused on training Ministry staff in the use of the Internet, searching for sport information, how to use email and other Internet services. Another focus of the work included designing and developing a Sports section on the Ministry of Education' website (http://www.moeys.gov.kh/). It is hoped that the new Sport Information Centre will become a cooperative venture of the Ministry and the Cambodian Olympic Committee and will be located near the offices of the Sport Magazine for the staff are skilled in finding and using sport information and also possess foreign language skills.

Mr. Meas Serey of the National Olympic Committee of Cambodia attended the IASI World Congress in Lausanne and has joined IASI.

News Bytes

Pan-European Sports Information Service (PESIS)

IASI President Alain Poncet, at the Seminar, outlined the plans for the Pan-European Sports Information Service (PESIS). It is proposed that this sports information service become the online gateway or portal to European sport information. A Task Force has been established that will work on making a proposal to the European Union. Task Force members include L. Bollaert, R. Claude, C. Igel, A. Madella, A. Poncet, Meyer & Meyer Gruppe, and Eifel Sport & Tourismus GmbH. The proposal will outline the legal framework, the cooperative arrangement among private and governmental entities, the administration of the PESIS affairs, and the financial plan and budget. The objectives of PESIS are to identify and collect data into one database, develop methodology and online communication channels for the data on sport participation, policies, sport structures, education and coaching.

CPLP-Sport (Comunidado des Paises de Lingua Portuguesa – Sport / Portuguese Speaking Countries Community – Sport)

Mr. João Paulo Rocha, from the Centre for Sport Studies and Training (CEFD) in Lisbon, Portugal, reported to the IASI Annual Meeting in Barcelona, that CPLP Sport, the network for the Portuguese-speaking sport information community has recently been launched. At present the CPLP Sport website is "Under Construction" at http://www.cplpsport.org/. Mr. Rocha mentioned that the website is being tested at the moment and will be online very soon. The network will include countries of Angola, Mozambique, São Tomé e Principe (two islands off the west coast of Africa), Guinea Bissau (west coast Africa), Republic of Cape Verde (Cabo Verde Islands, west coast Africa), Brazil and Macao. In his report, Mr. Rocha pointed out that in 2001 four technical missions were organized to Angola, Cabo Verde, Mozambique and São Tomé e

Principe where computer equipment was installed. The delegation also gave training sessions the use of the software and other online applications.

World Directory of Sport Information Centres and Experts (WDSICE) Launched http://www.directory-iasi.org/

At the IASI Annual Meeting in Barcelona, Pres. Alain Poncet gave a brief demonstration of the newly created World Directory. This project is a result of collaboration between the International Olympic Committee's Michel Filliau (Manager of NOC Administrative Dept), Nuria Puig, Head of External Relations and Mr. Poncet. The World Directory resides on the IOC Intranet.

At present the WDSICE has 83 sport information centres listed. The search engine provides flexible searching by continent, country or name of centre. Each listing has contact information with details of the subjects contained in each library following the main listing. Another feature of this directory is the capacity for each centre to update parts of the listing whenever it is necessary. These updates are sent to Mr. Poncet's email address for oversight of the system. Any sport information centre may submit the details of a centre by clicking on the Add button and following the instructions.
