Olympic Knowledge Services (OKS)

The International Olympic Committee has recently established a new information company call Olympic Knowledge Services (OKS). OKS will deliver and transfer knowledge-based and consulting services to Host and Bidding cities. OKS will ensure that the knowledge derived from specific Games will be available to other organizers and aspirants for future Olympic Games.

Melissa Kimmerly has been appointed as Information Manager of OKS. Ms Kimmerly was formerly the Information Manager of the Sydney 2000 Bid Committee and SOCOG. She later moved to positions as manager of the Games Code System and then was Results Manager for the Sydney Post Games Report (Official Report). With more than 10 years experience on the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games, she was the longest serving staff member of SOCOG. Mr. Crag McLatchey, former Secretary General of the Australia Olympic Committee will serve as Director of OKS. Mr. McLatchey will report to the OKS board to be chaired by IOC VP, Kevan Gosper. OKS will be based in Lausanne Switzerland and will open its offices in November 2001

Mauritius Sports Documentation and Information Centre

This past July, Barnabe Jolicoeur announced on IASI-L that the Mauritius Sports Documentation and Information Centre was inaugurated by the Hon. Ravi Raj Yerrigadoo, the Mauritius Minister of Youth and Sports. In a subsequent email, Barnabe, who is Director of Sport Information, mentioned that a website is under development and he is working on services and contacts with the coaches, sports researchers and administrators. He has a survey underway to determine who his potential clientele may be. The Centre's collection covers sports medicine, coaching and sport sciences, but the subjects of volleyball and drugs needs further strengthening. He and his sport administrators are looking forward to supporting and hosting the Island Ocean Indian Games in 2003 and the World Cadet Athletics Championships in 2005. New Zealand Recreation and Sport Agency

Robin White, Librarian at the Hillary Commission for Sport, Fitness and Leisure, reports that as of December 2001, the Hillary Commission will be replaced by a new crown agency called the Recreation and

Sport Agency (RSA). The vision of this new agency is "to ensure that all New Zealanders recognize the value of, and have access to, an active lifestyle that will lead to a healthier and more socially cohesive nation". This vision clearly incorporates a wish to keep developing sport and physical recreation in the community. Over time the RSA will examine the way sport is delivered and supported throughout New Zealand. A national recreation and sport strategy will be created which may result in a change of focus and some new priorities. Robin, in an email on IASI-L informed IASI members that she will be leaving the Commission. Amanda Bowen will assume Robin's position and email address (robinw@hillarysport.org.nz), temporarily until a new librarian is hired. This major, first ever, initiative, undertaken by the National Library of Australia, part of NLA's Pandora Project, provides access to the complete results of the Games, a once-a-day snapshot of the Official Website and a few other websites produced by other organizations. Jill hopes that this initiative will set a precedent for other documentation centers and national libraries. This type of website archiving is an important sport history tool for future sport science researchers. Australia's National Sport Information Centre & the Web Archive Project

Dublin Core Metadata Initiative (DCMI)

A number of IASI members have utilized the recommendations of the DCMI in the production of databases where websites and computer network and online resources are catalogued (e.g. SPONET). A new ANSI/NISO standard has just been approved (Sept. 10, 2001) that defines the fifteen metadata elements for online resource

Online Library Catalogues

The library OPAC landscape in Europe is changing rapidly with many more online national library catalogues and union catalogues available. The website **GABRIEL**: Gateway to Europe's National Libraries

http://www.bl.uk/gabriel/en/services has many more links to European libraries than a year ago. For instance there is a link to **DBI-LINK**, the large union catalogue for German libraries. A remote user may sign on as a guest. The front end instructions are in German and English for the convenience of many users.

The World Health Organization's **WHOLIS** online catalogue is available gratis <u>http://saturn.who.ch/.</u> This catalogue on health literature has all WHO publications from 1948 to date and journals and technical documents from 1985 to date.

Past Meeting/Conference Reports

9th EASM Conference Report

IASI President, Alain Poncet attended the EASM Conference, Sept 19-23, 2001 in Vitoria-Gasteiz, in the Basque region of Spain. He presented the over 450 conference participants with a report on the services, goals and products of IASI, and announced the forthcoming Directory of Sport Information Expertise, a cooperative project with the IOC/NOC, that should be available soon via the iasi.org website.

In between and after the plenary or parallel sessions, Alain had many opportunities to talk with the representatives from European sports organizations. He discussed creation of a new European Sport Information Platform to replace the important sport policy information functions that used to be provided by the now dismantled Sport for All Clearinghouse in Brussels.

ENSSHE Forum, Aug.30-Sept 2, 2001

Alain Poncet, President, IASI and Ayala Maharik, IASI VP for Europe attended the 6th Forum in Budapest, Hungary on behalf of IASI. Ayala reports that the Faculty of Sports Sciences and Physical Education at the Semelweiss University did a splendid job of organizing the forum.

The European Network for Sports Sciences in Higher Education, which has recently changed its name to European Network of Sport Sciences, Education and Employment (ENSSEE), was founded in 1991. Its members come from 220 sport sciences institutes and organizations, sport responsible for educational programs and/or research in sport in 34 countries throughout the European Union and affiliate countries. Every 2 years the network holds an annual meeting or forum. There are two major elements of this forum: 1) professional lectures and workshops and 2) the with committee organizational part meetings, elections, etc.

Through formal presentation and non-formal talks and discussions, two IASI goals were achieved: 1) outlining the work of IASI in the promotion of Sport Information, 2) suggesting new ways of collecting sports information in Europe in order to continue the good work that was done by the nowclosed Clearing House. Alain gave a very focused and clear Power Point presentation about IASI, its goals, members, and projects. Ayala sought out faculty members from different European universities in order to or make connections find to their information centers or libraries, hoping to bring more members to IASI.

Both IASI representatives took part in a very interesting meeting between the presidents of ICSSPE, ENSSEE, EASM and Mr. Hans Jurgen Meyer of the Meyer & Meyer Group. The professional organizations are interested in creating an improved version of the former clearinghouse. Meyer & Meyer is well-positioned to assist in this endeavor as they have recently taken over the equipment and location of an Internet company. This gives them the opportunity to offer to build up an information center in sport, in cooperation with the professional organizations.

As mentioned previously, further discussions between representatives of about 20 professional organizations in Europe on this topic will be made in Bitburg, Germany, between November 30th and December 2nd, when the Sport & Tourismos office will host a European Conference on the co-ordination of Sports Information. Alain and Ayala will participate in this conference

At the end of the ENSSHE Forum both presidents of ENSSEE and IASI signed an agreement of cooperation. The agreement gives a formal framework to the relationship between the two organizations and declares that its main goal is to upgrade the quality and dissemination of sport information among the members of both institutions. The agreement also states that each organization may invite to its meetings from time to time a representative of the other.

IASI-Europe/ENSSEE/EASM Meeting, Bitburg, Germany, October 4-5, 2001

As a result of the groundwork done by Alain Poncet and Ayala Maharik at the EASM and ENSSHE meetings in August, an additional meeting of representatives of the three organizations met in Bitburg, Germany on October 4-5 to discuss the feasibility of creating a European Sport Information Platform. This Platform would fill the gap left by the disbanding of the Sport for All Clearinghouse in Brussels last year. The Bitburg working group has proposed and is planning a European conference for representatives from 15 European sports organizations for November 30 to December 2, 2001 to be held in Bitburg. At this

conference the main purpose will be to discuss methods, strategy and first steps to be taken in creating and establishing a European Sports Information Platform. This new organization will depend on the cooperation of all organizations to create a central service that does not duplicate work or resources found at other organizations or on other websites. Cooperative partners may include the publisher Meyer & Meyer Group for the technological foundation, and other organizations for e-journals, e-learning and fulltext resources, and informational databases. After consultation of all interested parties, this extremely interesting project will be submitted to the EU for approval, recognition and funding. IASI-Europe will play an essential role in this new organization. Members will be kept informed, step by step, and IASI-Europe members will be asked to participate in this project.

Major Sports Events Guide, 2002-2012

London: Sportcal Global Communications, 2001. 250p. Cost: \$750 US with **special price** for IASI members of \$500.

Sportcal, a company that supplies information on over 32,000 sporting events via a website subscription, has launched a new print publication call the Major Sports Events Guide. This inaugural print edition lists over 85 sports and 190 major international sporting events. For each listing by sport, e.g. Cycling, the major event is described (UCI World Road Championships). Then follows a listing by date of previous events and location, plus future events, including location or whether a location is being decided or a bidding opportunity is available. The section on the analysis of the previous event gives data on number of hours of worldwide broadcasting coverage, which companies had TV and radio rights, and who were the major sponsors. An important last section describes the facilities and environmental conditions necessary for this particular event. A last section lists Bidding Opportunities by year. This guide will be useful to companies and organizations wishing to host major sporting events. For those who purchase this print volume, Sportcal will provide a one year online access where updates to directory listings will be available.
